

The school's curriculum is aligned with the standards set by the Department of Education combined with the Common Core Curriculum. The standards are designed to be robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young people need for success in college and careers.



As part of the AP Spanish Class, students exchanged letters with trainees from the Buffalo Seminary High School in New York. In April, they came to Puerto Rico to learn our Hispanic culture. They attended a Master Class at The Palmas Academy conducted by students from our Geography and AP Spanish class.



As part of the Portuguese class, students received a visit from a language specialist from Portugal. He was able to talk about the grammatical and regional differences between Brazil and Portugal and how accents vary throughout Lusophone countries.

Additionally, on March 5th the students received the visit of Mr. Glauber Rosa, a translator and interpreter from Río de Janeiro, who spoke about the different regions in Brazil, their accents, and even the Carnival. Finally, the Portuguese class presented a mini play called "A Aurora da minha vida", Act: "Aula de Português", where students had the opportunity to demonstrate what they have learned so far. Well done, **Mrs. Noguera!** 

The Portuguese curriculum was developed and the SSL curriculum was revised.



We continued with our vegetable garden project as part of the Science curriculum. The school garden had its first harvest sale of this academic year on January 29th. Among the vegetables sold were arugula, Tropicana lettuce, beets, scallions, cilantrillo, mint, and recao. Students then planted cabbage among other vegetables and, by the end of the semester, they had the Dolphin "sofrito" sale of our own.




